In Psalm 103, King David finds himself in a sad, almost depressed, state. We don't know what has happened, or when he penned these words; but it's obvious that joy has escaped him. See, King David suffered from spiritual amnesia. He had forgotten all the great things and many blessings he had received from the Lord. So David reminds himself of God's character and good works. That He forgives, redeems, and restores our brokenness. That He is the One who works healing in our life. That His love and compassion never fail and only He truly satisfies. David continues recounting the blessings of God until verse 22 where he joyously shouts - "Praise the Lord."

If you're seeking joy in the pleasures of life, or letting its concerns weigh you down, joy will be far from you. Instead, like King David, stop looking inward or outward, and start looking upward to the true source of joy; Jesus Christ. Crush your spiritual amnesia and drive away those despondent feelings by recounting the many blessings and benefits from the Lord.
