## Reconciled

2 Corinthians 5:14-21



What happens when a relationship goes bad? Trust is replaced by suspicion, insecurity, anxiety, and anger. When each side focuses on their own desires, things go from bad to worse. Sometimes things get so bad that we lose hope it will ever improve. It is a miserable way to live. It's even worse when alienation develops relationships. And since the most important relationship is with God, when we are

in really important alienated from Him; it taints everything. Thankfully, God doesn't write us off. He restores broken relationships.

Jesus did everything necessary to reconcile our relationship with God. But it wasn't easy. In fact, it cost Jesus his life. When we understand what Jesus did so that we could be reconciled with God, it changes the way we view the broken relationships we have with other people. When we link ourselves to Jesus, our old self dies with its self-centered perspective, and we are made new creations with a new vision for life.

Once we are at peace with God, He gives us the ministry of reconciliation. As ambassadors of our King, we represent His character, His authority, and His message. God makes His appeal through us as we implore others to be reconciled to God.
