When Covid Passes Away



Revelation 21:1-4



My town is starting to open up again after the shut-downs caused by Covid. Things are still not normal. Some changes seem for the better: people are outside more. Family dinners are back. Those are good things. On the other hand: churches are still closed. We're having to wear masks. I know people who have become sick.

One of the hardest things for me to see is the reaction of my boys as we pass people on walks. They're eager to interact (that's good), but they're also wary of getting too close to others. My son told me that he's not afraid to get sick himself, but he's afraid to get someone else sick. Fear, sickness, and distance are creating barriers to community which is already difficult enough in our broken world. But it won't always be like this.

God's word gives us a picture of where He is directing human history. By giving us a picture of where he is directing all things, God has given us a trajectory to align our lives with, right now. That picture is also a source of profound hope. It won't always be like this. One day we will live in a place where death itself has died. There will be no barriers to community. No masks, no fear, no Covid. That place will be characterized by a fullness of life, joy, and fellowship because we will once again be restored to the very presence of God. It won't always be like this.
